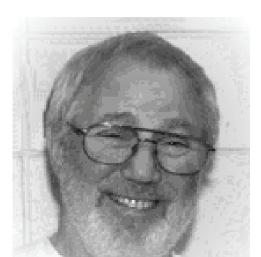

I always thought that people who sat in front of a computer and played games were wasting a lot of time...but I need to change that conception now.

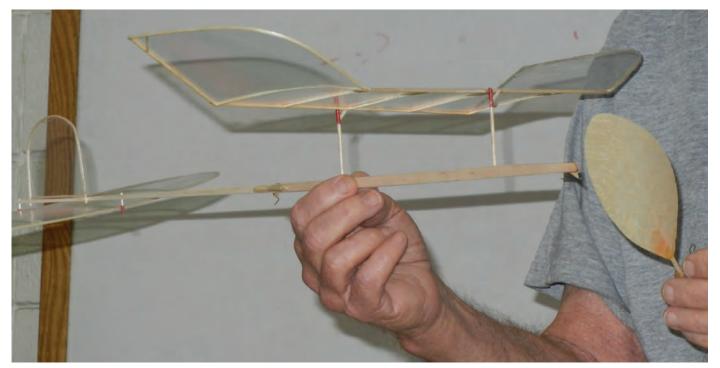

Monthly Meeting November 2011

The November SAM 27 meeting was held on the 16th at the fire house. President (El Jefe) Chip Buss opened the meeting at 7:04 pm and spent about one minute with his usual rhetoric until Bob Rose kindly interrupted him with a loud sneeze.....and we liked it! Chip welcomed two guests--Rod Persons brought George Sackman, and Ed Hamler brought Larry Green. Twenty four regular members were in attendance.

Chip conducted a discussion of flight line safety rules, which seems to be an ongoing project. Occasionally a member will launch his model from the runway side of the safety fence and take a little more time returning to the piloting area than some would like. Rather than using a less than subtle method, perhaps approaching said pilot and saying something like "Please, when you are ready, let's go back to the safety area." would be more effective. Friendly words normally work the best.

We all need to be cognizant of what is going on around us, whether we are flying or just observing. We need to know where other pilots are when we are on the flying line, whether there are models landing or taking off, and from which direction, and if there are any full scale aircraft in the area, among many safety con-

cerns. All of this requires us to not only visibly see the situation, but to listen to what's going on around us. This is called situational awareness, and it is one of the greatest factors in safety. We should avoid unnecessary conversation with pilots while they are flying, and make sure we never obstruct their view. This is all elementary, but sometimes we need a little reminding.

Chip took photographs of much of Tony Cincotta's models and equipment which we will be selling in the near future. Jim Temple has kindly let us store these items at his shop in Novato.

Andrew Tickle talked about altitude and/or time limiting devices being used by some electric powered gilder pilots. Designed to cut power to the motor at 200 meters, or lower, this has enabled some mass launched competitions between models with different power setups. Only the glide is timed. and everybody (theoretically) starts at the same altitude. Aric Wilmunder has some experience with these devices and offered his input. Several members expressed some interest in possibly acquiring one of these devices, and others had valid questions about their utility. More research and discussions will take place before any mass order is placed. Some information about these devices

can be found at soaringcircuits.com.

Rod Persons won the \$30 raffle gift card and promised not to spend it on fuel or batteries--Rod is a rubber guy.

Show and Tell:

Last Month's Mystery Plane was...

The Kaiser-Fleetwings XBTK



A replacement by the US Navy for the Curtis Helldiver and the Grumman Avenger was in the works in 1942 with the hopes of a lighter and faster dive bomber. Since the workloads at all manufacturers was quite heavy at the time the Navy assigned the design to companies without a lot of wartime production. They selected the Fleetwings company at Bristol, Pennsylvania which was shortly aquired by Henry J. Kaiser in 1943. Production of a prototype was started in 1944.

Changes in dive bomber designs

included external storage of ordinance, radar to be stored under the left wing, with dive brakes both upper and lower at the inboard trailing edge of the wings. The tail fin was raised off the fuselage and placed on the horizontal stabilizer avoiding buffeting when dive brakes were deployed. An unusual feature was the exhaust placement aft of the cockpit. This caused a problem with overheating of the cockpit and getting out of the airplane with a hot exhaust. The wings had leading edge slats.

As with most prototypes there were problems. Inadequate engine cooling and major fuselage vibration. Flight testing continued at the Patuxent River NAS in Maryland. The Navy ordered only 10. It was fitted with a R-2800 engine. By 1946 the role was being filled by the Douglas Skyraider and the

Martin Mauler.

After the contract was terminated all five prototypes were scrapped. Henry J. Kaiser went on to create cars and a great Health Care organization—Kaiser Permanente.

First flown in April of 1939 it went into operation in its home country's Royal air force.

First fitted with a 900 HP aircooled radial it eventually was upgraded to a 1025 HP radial.

Wingspan was a little over 36 feet with a maximum speed of 342 miles per hour.

This all metal fighter and ground attack airplane was comparable to its contemporary Bf 109, Hurricane, and Spitfire. Production problems and lack of available armament delayed its entry into service. It remained in front line use until 1944 and could still compete with aircraft such as the P38.

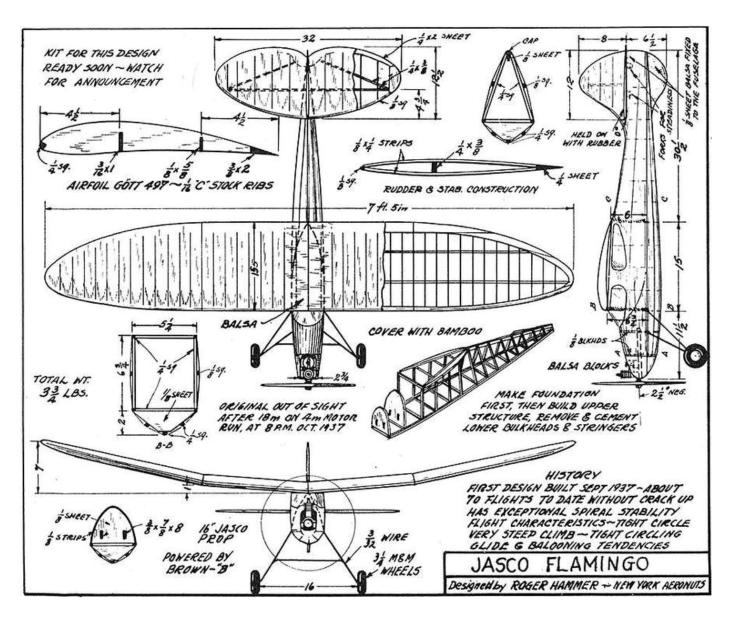
The main reason I am writing this is to ask you to make your check payable to Jay Beasley-SAM 27, instead of just SAM 27,
