For the wings he cuts the root and tip ribs to shape and cuts the others roughly to shape, glues them to the leading and trailing edges. Sands them to shape and cuts for the stringers and sands again. Gale showed

a project of a fictitious WW11 fighter.

Rod Persons – Presented Jerry Rocha with a Jimmy Allen model that he threw away. Rod repaired it and is ready for covering. The plane was damaged when Jerry was winding it and the hook on the winder straightened out and went through the model.

Scenes from Lakeville International

Is it really an old-timer? It is designed to look like a "Junior" And it does a very good job of it.. But...if you look closely you can see all of the wooden structure through the covering. It has the old fashioned way of putting the landing gear forward and it has a lot of dihedral like the old timers.



Another fine (*actually...very, very fine*) free flight and rubber powered model of a Curtis F6C-4 biplane from Gale Wagner. It's worth a trip to the field to see Gale fly his models and even more so to get a close look and a chat with Gale. His approach to free flight is almost spiritual.



Chip Buss and his massive Rocketeer. This is one huge airplane and is powered by an electric motor. Last year we put several small foam Aeronca Champs on the wing and used it for a runway. This is definitely the Behemoth of Lakeville.





The ground crew is now bringing the giant to the end of the runway for its launch



As the watts flow through its giant electric motor, the Rocketeer lifts upward to the sky. You would not necessarily need good vision to keep up with this one. It's probably up to 500 feet in this shot.



At this point the two stage rocket is about to drop the initial booster stage (the fuselage) which will dive to earth and leave a upper state (the wing) to float down at a very casual and easy pace.



The ground crew heads to the booster stage which had the glide ratio of a cast iron frisbee. As it landed ti decided to catch on fire.



The rocketeer had one its most successful flights yet. The duration of the upper stage was unlike any you've seen. It took forever to finally make it back to earth.



This is all that is left of the booster stage. It looks like another project to repair this one. What happened was that the front of the wing came up a slight bit and the force lifted it up and off of the fuselage. Breaking all tie-downs.

The US Free Flight Championship

The US Free Flight Championships (26, 27, 28 September) brought some success for two SAM 27 members, though once again the Lost Hills weather played silly tricks with competitors. Out of the three days, only two were flyable, since the final day, Sunday started with a steady breeze which progressively increased to 8 meters/sec (18 mph) about an hour after start time. While this wind speed was still acceptable to contestants, the risk of damage after landing (with aircraft blowing across the sandy surface) meant that people were happier to keep their creations in the box, rather than risk breaking them when the scoring flight was over.

However, with Friday and Saturday, it was a different story;

conditions on both days were good enough to offer plenty of 'good air' and John Pratt, flying his large Korda 'DT' in the Old Time Cabin contest, with 'Rise Off Table' launches (rather than the ground itself) returned a perfect score. After recording three five-minute maxes, he added six minute and

seven minute flights to put himself well ahead of the field to take first place. Meanwhile, Paul Masterman flying a "Majestik' P-30 (a successful design from two decades ago which remains highly competitive) also made a 'no errors' score with three two minute flights, followed by a two and a half minute max. Since this was on Saturday and flying was available all three days with this class, he held over going for the three minute max until the next day – which turned out the 'wash-out' day, so he remained top of the class!


John's last flight was something of a surprise; after the usual – and very consistent - climb, the model appeared to be in good air. This turned out not to be just 'good' but spectacular. The aircraft DT'ed soon after the max was scored, but the final flight time to the ground was around 18 minutes. which gives a hint of the strength of the thermals at Lost Hills in the middle of the afternoon. It's a good

job we use radio location beacons on free flight ships these days; they get hard to see when they're in the air for that length of time!





Designed in 1931. This small plane had a passenger seat next to the pilot; this gave the instructor a much easier made flight instruction much easier and many flew solo in less than five hours. The fact that it was a real "floater" made this a very predictable and easy airplane to fly. It was powered by a 36 horsepower, two cylinder opposed engine.

Maximum speed was approximately 95 mph with a range of 200 miles.
