OLD BUSINESS

John Carlson forgot to bring examples of the SAM 27 welcome letter and the fact sheet now being sent to new members. Copies are reproduced elsewhere in this edition of the Antique Flyer so everyone will know what we are doing. Rocco Ferrario will have copies at the next meeting available for guests and for members who may wish to inform potential members of what SAM 27 is about. Tim Younggren suggested that the welcome letter package include copies of the SAM 27, 1995 Club Project (1/4 A Nostalgia), gas rules and possibly some plans. Tim Youngaren distributed copies of the "final" version of the 1/4A Nostalgia free flight gas rules. These are also reproduced elsewhere in this newsletter. Rocco offered to copy plans for the T-bird model appropriate for this project and make these available to members at the December meeting. The plans shown in the November Antique Flver scaled to about 150 square inches would be suitable for 1/4 A models. The interest expressed by attendees indicate we should have a good turnout of models for the four meets scheduled from June through September.

and send copies of these and other material he receives to Wes. Jerry Rocha will continue with the meets schedule. Don will also keep the mailing list up-todate on his computer.


BUTTON TIMERS

NEW BUSINESS


Guest Speakers for February

1995 RAFFLE PRIZES



GUEST PRESENTATION

Bill Bethke, assisted by Walt Paulholzer, showed, discussed and demonstrated the 5 cylinder 4-cycle radial engines Bill has constructed. Bill has owned and operated several machine shops over the years and has done specialty contract work for the aerospace industry. Walt is Bill's next door neighbor and also an accomplished machinist. Bill obtained the plans from Forest Edwards of Grass Valley who has CIC equipment and has made a 5 cylinder radial engine with a Roots blower as well as a 2 cylinder model. Bill, not having CIC equipment, did his the hard way - all manual. To maximize the use of each set-up. Bill made two engines plus a number of extra parts. Material was primarily 6061T6 aluminum. Valves were 303 stainless and the cranks were from 4130 steel.

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Push rods were made from drill rod. The pistons feature cast iron rings. Ignition is glow plugs and each engine has an integrated oil pump. The engines weigh about 5 1/2# and are about 10 - 12" diameter and develop about 3 1/2 HP at 6,000 RPM. Bill started work in January 1994 and has about 400 hours in each engine. Bill and Walt C-clamped one engine with its 20"+ prop to the table and, after clearing some of the attendees from the immediate area, attempted to start the little beauty with Walt swinging the prop. After a couple of minutes of futile prop spinning, Bill discovered he had the fuel line connected to the tank vent instead of the pick-up. With that corrected, a few more spins resulted in a successful start to the sounds of cheers by all present. The prop blast was waving the flags at the head of the room and sucking long cobwebs out of the rest of the room. The engine sound was great and not nearly as loud as some had anticipated. A few minutes of running produced a blue exhaust cloud in the room prompting shutdown and temporary departure outdoors for several members. We thank Bill and Walt for showing these beautifully crafted engines and also Remo for arranging the visit.

SHOW & TELL

TIM YOUNGGREN showed the fuselage of his 1/4 A model to demonstrate the mounting of one of the button D/T timers. December 1994

Tim made a mounting flange from balsa and plywood. Manufacturing modifications in progress will include an integrated mounting flange.

RAY MC GOWAN showed his entry into the 1/4 A Nostalgia project. It was a Campbell kit T-bird model beautifully framed and only awaiting covering. Ray reported that the \$27.00 kit was generally of pretty good quality. He also dispelled the myth that glow plugs were a relatively recent development. He showed a glow plug manufactured by the Edison Company, probably shortly after the turn of the century. The plug was about 10" long and Ray did not know what its original intended use was.

NICK SANFORD showed a wing he had covered with polyspan, a relatively new product. It is a tissue-like material with random polyester fibers. Polyspan is waterproof but does require dope to seal it, but much less than silkspan. The finished weights are comparable but polyspan is much stronger. It cannot be dyed in water but color dyes may be mixed with dope or dissolved in thinner and then sprayed onto the doped surface. Nick was very pleased with the appearance and handling of the product. A complete write-up is in the December 1994 issue of Flying Models and is available from Starline International of Arizona for \$15.00 per 20" X 12' roll plus \$2.00 postage and handling.

<u>JUNIOR OLD</u> <u>TIMER BRIAN</u> <u>CAS</u><u>SAYRE</u> showed a partially-framed Wasp 1/2 A model. Brian is developing into quite a craftsman. We hope to see the finished product soon.

DICK <u>O'BRIEN</u> showed a couple of .049 O.K. engines, one "new." Apparently someone located a stash of these new/old engines and is selling them for \$8.95 each. Dick hasn't run his as yet.

DON BEKINS has a computer program which can scan a photograph and produce a line drawing. The example he displayed was impressive. Don has plans for this process and will tell more in future meetings.

STEVE REMINGTON brought a 36" J-3 Cub kit by Herr Engineering. A very nice kit but the amazing part (to many of us who had not yet seen such) was the laser cut "print" wood. The cut edges were clean as a "whistle" and literally fell out of the sheet. The wing ribs even had triangular lightening holes (also falling out).



1995 CLUB PROJECT

1/4 A REPLICA / NOSTALGIA FREE FLIGHT GAS

1. <u>PURPOSE</u>: To encourage all SAM 27 members to participate in the construction and flying of 1/4 A Replica/Nostalgia F/F gas models. The primary thrust of this project should be relaxation, participation, and FUN! FUN! FUN!

 <u>DESIGN ELIGIBILITY</u>: Any free flight gas powered model airplane design that was produced and marketed in kit form or had plans published in a commercial publication prior to December 31, 1956 shall be deemed eligible. (John Pond's most recent Old Timer/Nostalgia catalog shall be the master list of eligible designs.)

- 3. <u>ENGINE ELIGIBILITY</u>: Any COX front intake valve or reed valve rear intake .010 or .020 shall be the eligible engines approved for this event. These engines may not be modified in anyway, except to make reed valve rear intake fuel tanks compatible with an alternate fuel tank system, if so desired.
- 4. <u>ENGINE RUNS AND FLIGHT LIMITS</u>: Engine runs and maximum flight limits shall be established at the discretion of the CD depending on the contest site and associated weather conditions. However the following engine runs and maximum flight limits are to be followed unless altered by the CD as described above.

Engine Run: 10 Seconds.

Flight Limit: 2 Minute maximum flight limits. (no fuse D/T's)

- 5. <u>REGULATION OF FLIGHTS</u>: A total of five (5) attempts shall be allowed to make three (3) official flights. An official flight shall be any official attempt of thirty (30) seconds or more in duration. Flyoff flights which may be required to declare a winner shall comply with the same engine run and flight limits as established for the original (3) official flights. All flights shall be Hand-Launched.
- 6. MISCELLANEOUS: A. There will be no weight limits to the model.
 - B. There will be no wing area limits to the model.
 - C. Any size or shape of propeller may be used.
 - D. Any fuel may be used.
 - E. Scaling of designs up or down is permitted.
 - F. Two (2) models shall be permitted per contest. Each must be entered separately. However, only one of the models shall be eligible to win a first through fifth place.
 - G. The builder of the model must fly his own model. No Proxy flying is permitted.
- PROOF OF ELIGIBILITY: The authenticity and proof of compliance of questionable model design shall be the sole responsibility of the contestant. However, the CD shall retain final authority in all considerations.

8. CONTEST DATES AND DETERMINATION OF WINNERS: There will be four (4)

contests held in 1995. They will be held at the Lakeville field on the first Saturday of the months of June, July, August, and September, (unless otherwise agreed to by the Sam 27 membership at their regular meeting held on the month before the next scheduled contest). Contests will begin at 8:00am with the last official flight no later than 12:00 noon. There will be prizes for the top three finishers (i.e. balsa, props, fuel, etc.) at each of the monthly contests. Monthly contest winners will be assigned points as follows:

1st Place	5	
2nd Place	4

Sweepstakes winner will be the contestant with the highest point total of the three (3) entered contests. Contestants must enter three (3) of the four (4) scheduled contests to be eligible for the sweepstakes prize. Only the points earned from the three (3) entered contests will be used in determining the point totals.

The sweepstakes prize will be determined by the SAM 27 membership at the February 1995 regular meeting. An entry fee of Five (\$5) dollars will entitle a contestant to participate in all four scheduled contests.

If enough Juniors participate (i.e. three or more), separate prizes could be established for them. This would be at the discretion of the SAM 27 membership. Otherwise, they will compete in the open category.

Welcome to SAM 27! SAM 27 was formed in 1976. Five of the founders are still active members. Membership has varied from a low of 7 to a current 75 members. About 50 are from the north bay, San Francisco area, several are from other parts of the US and foreign countries; the balance are from other areas of California. SAM 27 members include the newly elected SAM national officers of President, Don Bekins, and Western VP, Ed Hamler.

SAM 27 is a multi-interest old timer modeling club with emphasis on R/C assist. A number of members also participate or specialize in free flight, rubber indoor and outdoor, hand launch gliders and thermal and slope R/C gliders. Several members are major competitors with many trophies from regional and national contests, and include some past and present record holders. A number of our members are MECA engine collectors. All are encouraged to join the Society of Antique Modelers. An application is enclosed.

SAM 27 sponsors a very successful Junior Old Timer Program with about 15 current members under the age of 20. The program includes several levels of building and competing with HLG through rubber stick and cabin, to LER/ Texaco, free flight, or R/C. The club provides assistance in the way of materials and mentoring.

Meetings are held on the 3rd Wednesday of each month, usually at the Novato Fire Department training room on Atherton Ave. Occasionally special locations are selected as a meeting site. An average of 25 to 30 attend the meetings which are lively and entertaining. In addition to covering business matters, the meetings include Show&Tell, a raffle and usually a technical presentation by a member or other person with a particular expertise.


An illustrated monthly newsletter of professional quality keeps members informed on past, current and future events, and frequently contains editorial material and technical articles.

SAM 27's flying site off the Lakeville highway southeast of Petaluma in Sonoma County is the location for several well attended contests and fun flys during the year including an O/T rubber contest and 1/2 A Texaco Postal meets. The site is sufficiently away from housing be permit to flying of unmuffled ignition engines. Many members use the site for test flying both R/C and free flight models.

In addition to meets at the Lakeville site, SAM 27 sponsors a annual two day meet known as the Crash & Bash with mostly R/C assist events. For the past several years the C&B has been held at the Elk Grove ranch of Loren and Miriam Schmidt, members of SAM 27 as well as SAM 30. A more pleasant site for a meet would be hard to find. There is much open space for flying edged by lawns and shade trees. Overnight camping, motor homes and trailers are welcome. Friday and Saturday dinners, and lunches each day are features of the contest. Participation of 40 to 55 contestants as well as family and friends make this an old timer meet to be remembered.


Club activities are funded by member dues of \$15 per year and several fund raising events. These include a raffle at the monthly meetings, with a year end prize of considerable value. A major fund raiser is the annual contest, the Crash & Bash. Sources are event fees, the lunches and dinners as well as a raffle with an attractive grand prize which in 1994 is a complete, ready-to-fly Ohlsson 60 powered "Riser Rider" model, including several trophies and ribbons it has won.

The club also sells Ohlsson & Rice logo T-Shirts, SAM 27 polo shirts, and special O&R logo decals. These fund raisers help to support the club's non-profit youth activities as well as keep the annual dues low and maintain solvency.




September 1952 Model Airplane News Published this 38 in. wing span ZEPHYR by Sal Taibi. It is another possibility for the 1995 Club Project.





Above: Playboy Jr. with Ohlsson 29, silk coverd. Taken at Stagecoach dry lake, about 25 miles east of Carson City, Nv.






Membership is \$15 for the calendar year. After February, the dues for a new member will be prorated.

Membership meetings are held on the third Wednesday of each month at the Navato Fire Department, Training Room, on Atherton Ave. at 7:30 P.M.


